 **Appeal after teenager assaulted - Long Melford** 



 Police are appealing for witnesses after an assault in Long Melford. 

 The incident happened in High Street outside the Melford Hall on Friday 1 November at approximately 11pm. 



 A 17-year-old female teenager was approached by a male teenager who has assaulted her in the face, causing swelling to her nose and a cut to her eyebrow. 



 The victim was assisted by several members of the public, but no details were taken from them. The offender walked off. 



 A 19-year-old male teenager from the Long Melford area was arrested on suspicion of assault ABH and has been bailed to return to Bury Police Investigation Centre on 02/12/13. 



 Police are appealing for anyone who witnessed the incident to come forward and contact PC Kevin McCarthy from Hadleigh on 101, quoting crime reference SU/13/2192. 



 **Specials Superintendent Retiring after 40 years** 



 Specials Superintendent Gloria Lawrence will be retiring later this month after volunteering with Suffolk Police for forty years. 



 Gloria joined the Special Constabulary on 25 October 1973 in Ipswich as a Special Constable and moved up through the ranks to her current role. Her last day will be Tuesday 12 November. 



 She fulfilled many roles both in Ipswich and Stowmarket, including working on the traffic unit for eight years, escorting prisoners, presenting information evenings to promote the role of Specials, helping to run assessment centres and arranging Specials assemblies for the last 15 years. 

 Specials Superintendent Gloria Lawrence said: "I have always been a people person and therefore enjoyed working in the public sector dealing with the general public. I always wanted to be a police officer but due to life circumstances something always stopped me so I joined the Special Constabulary in 1973. 

 "The main difference between now and back then is the amount of training Specials get nowadays. Back then you were given a little black book to read and allowed to go out on patrols one Saturday a month. The nickname for them was 'hobby bobbies' as you couldn't develop further and it was just seen as an 'interest' for someone to do in their spare time. 



 "Nowadays the training is very in-depth as the role of the Specials is seen as a stepping stone to joining the police and they deal with situations that any police officer would. I would probably say that 95% of people that join the Specials have the aim of getting into the regular police." 

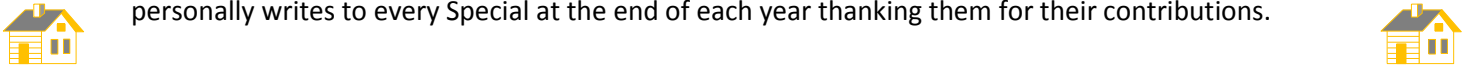
 Gloria has previously worked for the Post Office, Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service and Suffolk Constabulary within the Enquiry Office and as a Control Room Operator in the Contact and Control 



 







 Room. She has also been involved with three jail and bails to raise money for CLIC Sargent and personally writes to every Special at the end of each year thanking them for their contributions. 



 In 2000, she met the previous Home Office Minister Paul Boateng about a new scheme which she helped to set up involving Specials being attached to the hospital to improve the security and safety of staff and patients. 

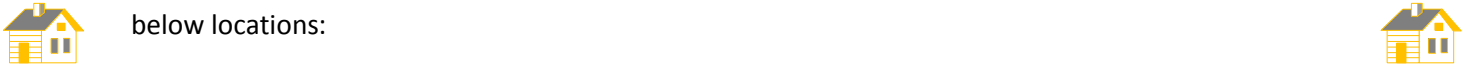


‘CESAR’ agricultural marking event cancelled

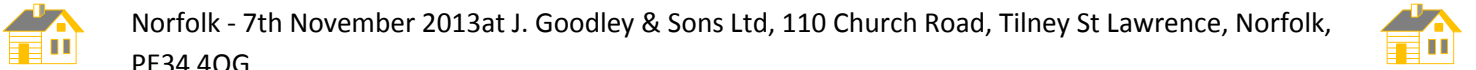

Appeal after items of taxidermy and oil paintings stolen - Bures

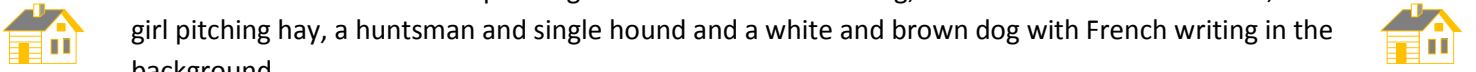
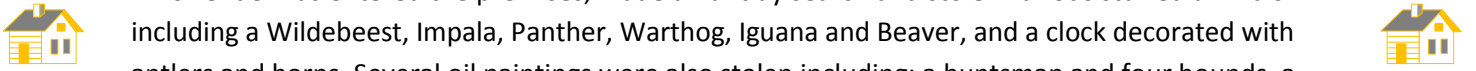
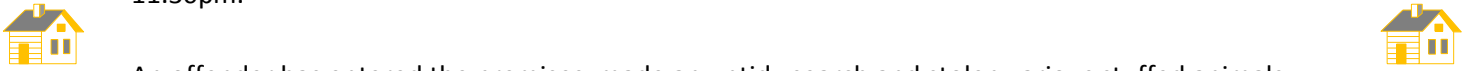
Police are appealing for information after items of taxidermy and oil paintings were stolen in Bures.



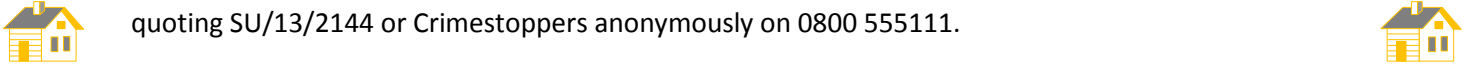
The incident happened at an outbuilding in Bures on Saturday 26 October at approximately 11.30pm.

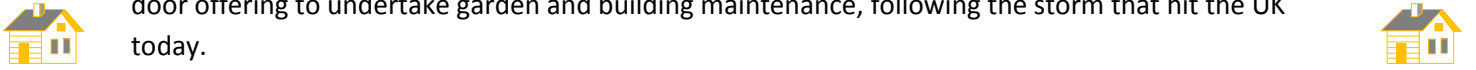
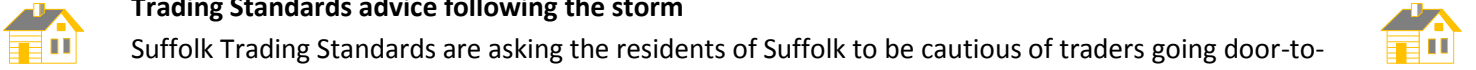

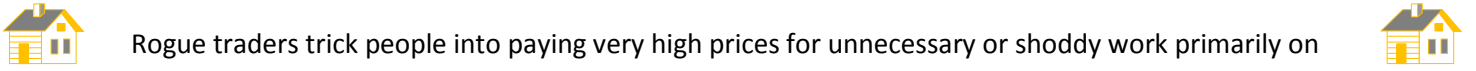


Trading Standards advice following the storm

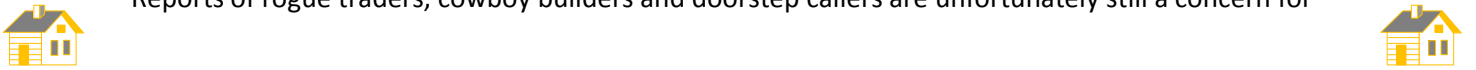
Suffolk Trading Standards are asking the residents of Suffolk to be cautious of traders going door-to-door offering to undertake garden and building maintenance, following the storm that hit the UK today.




Rogue traders trick people into paying very high prices for unnecessary or shoddy work primarily on homes or garden maintenance.





Reports of rogue traders, cowboy builders and doorstep callers are unfortunately still a concern for







 Suffolk Trading Standards. Each year, we receive many complaints from residents who have been


 conned on their own doorsteps by rogue traders. These cons can involve many thousands of pounds and often target vulnerable residents.


 To avoid becoming a victim of rogue traders, follow these simple steps:


 ← Never agree to have work done by somebody who is just passing or take their word that it needs to be done at all


 ← Never pay for work before it is completed

 ← Do not accept any offer from them to drive you to the bank to withdraw money


 ← If you need work done, then visit www.checkatrade.com – a free directory of reliable traders who are carefully vetted. Alternatively contact by phone on 0845 408 4866.


 Trading Standards is urging everyone who knows or cares for a vulnerable or elderly person to make sure they are aware of their rights when it comes to suspect door step approaches and to carefully research salespeople before inviting them into their home.


 No one should feel pressured into making a rash buying decision. If in doubt always think twice and get a second opinion.

 **CANDLE FIRE SAFETY WEEK: SNUFF OUT THE FIRE RISK**

 Fire and Rescue Services across the country are asking people to take care this Candle Fire Safety Week and snuff out the risk of fire in their homes

 With the days growing darker and winter setting in, a few candles scattered round the room can lend a warm glow to an evening in or add some festive cheer to the season’s celebrations such as Guy Fawkes’ night, Diwali and Christmas.

 But with candle fires resulting in around 350 casualties each year, Suffolk Fire & Rescue are asking people to take extra care with candles this winter - nearly 40% of all fires started by candles result in a death or injury.

 The most important step you can take to keep yourself and your loved ones safe is to ensure your home has a working smoke alarm. To prevent candle fires from starting in your home, you should make sure your candles are kept away from flammable materials like curtains and ensure candles are put out when you leave the room, even for a moment.

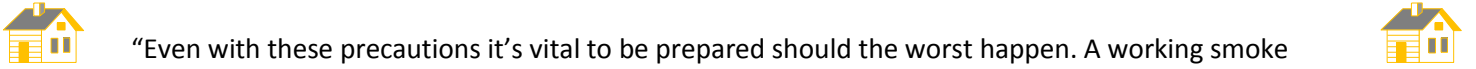
 A Suffolk Fire & Rescue spokesperson said
“Candles are a typical sight in many homes, scenting our rooms and giving an atmospheric glow to cold winter nights. But it’s important to remember that a candle is not just a decorative feature. Left unattended, an open flame scenting your home could leave a trail of devastation.



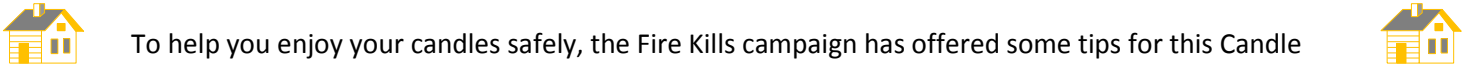




“Place your lit candles with extra care, away from curtains, pets and children and always remember to put them out when you leave the room, even for a moment.”



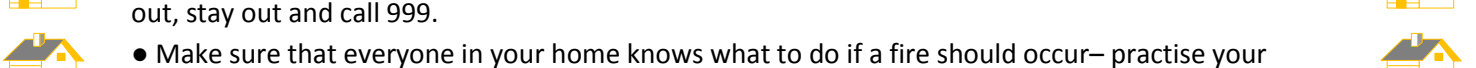
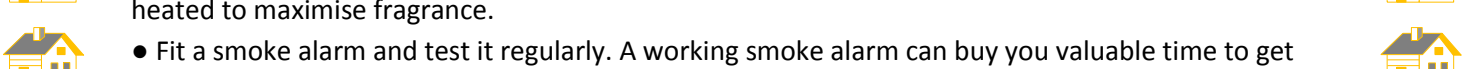
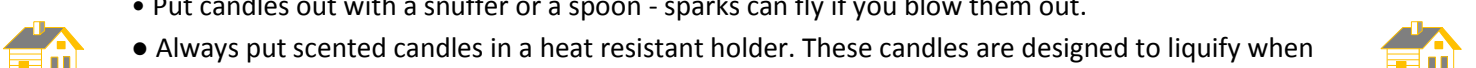
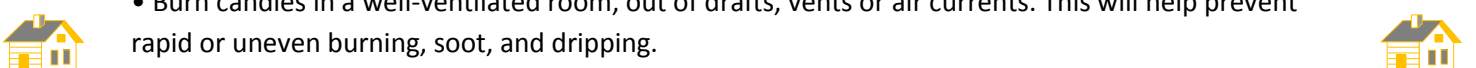
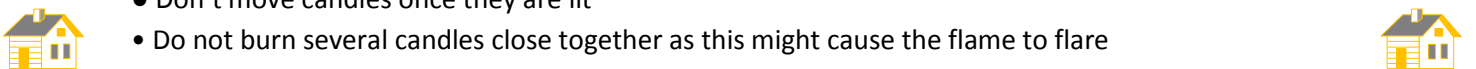
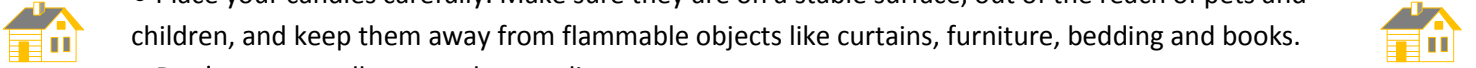
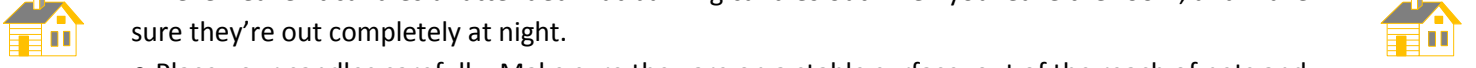
“Even with these precautions it’s vital to be prepared should the worst happen. A working smoke alarm can give you the vital time you need to get out, stay out and call 999. Keep yourself and your loved ones safe by testing your alarm regularly and by practicing your escape routes.”



To help you enjoy your candles safely, the Fire Kills campaign has offered some tips for this Candle Fire Safety Week:

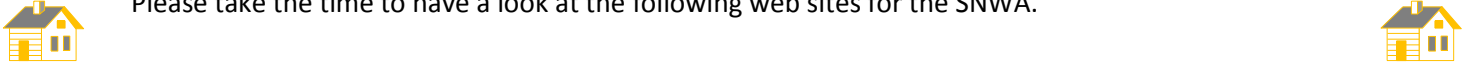


- Never leave lit candles unattended. Put burning candles out when you leave the room, and make sure they’re out completely at night.
- Place your candles carefully. Make sure they are on a stable surface, out of the reach of pets and children, and keep them away from flammable objects like curtains, furniture, bedding and books.
- Don’t move candles once they are lit
- Do not burn several candles close together as this might cause the flame to flare
- Burn candles in a well-ventilated room, out of drafts, vents or air currents. This will help prevent rapid or uneven burning, soot, and dripping.
- Put candles out with a snuffer or a spoon - sparks can fly if you blow them out.
- Always put scented candles in a heat resistant holder. These candles are designed to liquify when heated to maximise fragrance.
- Fit a smoke alarm and test it regularly. A working smoke alarm can buy you valuable time to get out, stay out and call 999.
- Make sure that everyone in your home knows what to do if a fire should occur– practise your escape route.
